perceptions of that testimony has a direct bearing on whether those statements that were made at trial by those witnesses were to be believed; that is to say whether the Prosecution's theory that the first set of witnesses were confused about what happened was in fact the case, specifically Officer

Van Fledering (phonetic specifing). And for these reasons, your Honor, we think that it is clear that these officers who had contact with the alleged eye-witnesses in this case were in fact res gestae witnesses, because by the Prosecution's own theory there is a direct difference of opinion as to whether their testimony should have been believed or in fact whether their testimony was credible. To the extent that the testimony or these officers goes directly or potentially directly to the credibility of those witnesses, we think that they are in fact res gestae witnesses themselves, your Honor.

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Evelyn.

Any response to that, Mr. Best?

MR. BEST: No. your Honor.

THE COURT: Based upon the information that the Court has before it, the Court is of the opinion that it does not have enough information to make a ruling on whether or not these witnesses are res gestae witnesses, and at this particular point all the Court knows is that the Defense has requested that these witnesses be brought in, and there is a question as to whether or not Mr. Lewis waived their pro-

duction at trial, I will reserve a ruling on whether or not 1 they are res gestae witnesses until I've heard their 2 testimony and argument of both Counsel. 3 MR. BEST: Thank you, your Honor. At this 4 time the People will call to the stand Officer Michael Kudla. 5 MICHAEL KUDLA, 6 sworn on behalf of the People, was examined and 7 testified upon his path as follows: 8 DIRECT EXAMINATION 9 BY MR. BEST: 10 for the record, Officer, will you identify yourself. 11 Michael Kudla. 12 How are you presently employed? 13 Detroit Police Department-14 How were you employed in July of 1976? Q15 As a police officer in the City of Detroit. 16 Who was your partner at that time? 17 Michael Yaklin. 18 On July 31st, 1976, at approximately one-fifty in the 19 morning do you remember anything unusual taking place? 20 I do. 21 Can you briefly tell us what that was, please. 22 We were responding to a radio call that a police 23 officer was shot at harper and Barrett.

And you responded to that call?

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- A We did. 1 Q What did you do when you got to the scene? 2 There was a large crowd of people there; Officer Yaklin 3 talked to a few, and I tried to get an ambulance to the 4 scene, there was none available. I called for another 5 scout car with a stretcher. I at that time assisted 6 putting Officer Bibokowski, who was laying on the curb 7 there, onto the stretcher and off to the hospital. I 8 then asked the people at the scene there if anybody 9 had seen anything and I believe two came up to me and 10 said they had. A sergeant arrived at the scane and 11 told us to take those people to the Homicide Section. 12 And did you take them to Homicide? 13 We did. 14 Oid you take any witness statements from any of those 15 people? 16 No, I did not. 17 At the time you arrived had the officer who was there 18 and took the call already been shot? 19
  - A Yes, he was.
  - Q Did you witness the shooting?
- 22 A No, sir.

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- 23 Q Did you see any assarlants at the scene?
- 24 A No, sir.
  - 0 Did you hear a gunshot?

- A No, sir.

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that the person who had been shot was a police officer?

- 20 **Q Did you tr**ansport any witnesses or potential witnesses
  21 **to the Ho**micide Section?
  - A I believe I did.
  - $\parallel \mathbb{Q}$  Did you take any statements from those witnesses?
  - 24 A No.
  - MR. BEST: I have no further questions.

#### CROSS EXAMINATION

#### BY MR. EVELYN:

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- Officer O'Connor, your partner was then Officer Andrew Kuklock?
- Correct. 5
  - Now, when you responded to this particular location at Harper and Barnett, you arrived there and there were other police officers; is that correct?
  - There were.
- Could you tell us about how many other police officers 10 (3) 11 were there?
- I really don't know. 12
- It would have been more than one, though; is that 13 correct?
  - There's a possibility, I don't know for sure.
  - Now, at the time you arrived and you exited your vehicle would it be fair to say the first thing you did was to go over to where there was a crowd of people?
  - It wouldn't be fair to say; I don't remember it.
  - Let me ask you this: Do you remember a crowd of people being present?
- I remember people being there, yes. 23
  - $\mathcal{O}$ Do you have any idea -- strike that. Do you have any recollection as to about how many people were

### "present?

- A I really couldn't say.
- Q Let me ask you this: Do you recall assisting and placing this injured person on the stretcher?
- A I do.

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- Q And you do recall other people besides police officers being present; is that correct?
- A Yes.
- Q And you recall making a report of these events or at least someone making a report when you got back to the police station; is that correct?
- A I did make a report.
  - Q A written report?
- A Yes, sir.
- Now, when you got to the location and you were assisting in putting this injured person on the stretcher, do you remember who strike that do you remember the other people who were participating in that?

#### A I don't.

- **O**Do you remember -- you do remember that there were other people assisting; is that correct?
- A Yes.
- 24 Q Do you recall whether your partner was assisting?
  - A I honestly can't say, I don't remember. I remember

- I understand, Officer; I'm just asking you what you remember and if you don't remember just tell me that you're not able to recall. But I'm trying to assist you if you can recall.
  - A Thank you.

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- Do you recall if the people who were assisting you in placing this person in the vehicle were police officers?
- A I don't remember. I would assume they were but I don't remember.
- Now, do you recall any of the people at the scene saying anything about a white car?
- $\parallel$  A I can't recall.
- Do you recall finding out later strike that. Do you recall learning that the person who was injured was a police officer?
- A Yes.
- Do you recall learning that among the people at the scene that there were also police officers, off-duty police officers?
- A Yes, I do.
- 23 Q Do you recall the name of Officer Van Fledering?
- 24 A No, I can't say that I do.
- 25  $\parallel$   $\mathbb Q$  Do you recall learning later that among the persons

present at the scene was the partner of the person 1 who was injured? 2 Yes. 3 4 Do you recall seeing a man and later learning that 5 he was a partner of the --I don't remember. 6 7 Do you recall any civilian -- strike that. Do you recall any persons present at that scene assisting 8 police officers at the scene and not being dressed 9 10 as a police officer? 11 No. I don't. You're not saying it didn't take place, you re just 12 saying you don't recall? 13 I just don't recall. 14 MR. EVELYN: Nothing further. 15 MR. BEST: I have nothing further, your Honor. 16 17 THE COURT: Thank you, Officer, you may step 18 down. 19 (Witness excused.) MR. BEST: Your Honor, there was one 20 additional witness that was mentioned in Defendant's pleadings 21 that he wanted produced, and that was Police Officer Joseph 22 Grayer. He was the partner of Police Officer Lorraine 23 24 Williams. They were in Scout 15-11, which I believe was the

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second unit to respond to the scene. In prior discussions

with Counsel and with this Court we agreed that should Defendant and Defense Counsel still demand production of 3 Officer Grayer, that he would be produced on January 20th. He is going to be produced on that date should the need 5 arise, but I imagine that's a determination that we yet have to make. At this point we have produced the four witnesses. the four police officers, that Defendant and Defense Counsel have demanded. Their testimony has been taken and I am prepared to officer argument at this time. 10 THE COURT: Mr. Evelyn, do you still wish 11 Officer Graver present? 12 MR. EVELYN: We do, your Honor. We think 13

Officer Grayer is particularly important in this case because he was Officer Williams partner.

THE COURT: Very well, instead of hearing argument at this time, I'll adjourn the matter to the 20th, at which time I will expect both Counsel and Officer Graver.

I understand Officer Grayer is on furlough at this time.

MR. BEST: He is, your Honor, but he will be here.

THE COURT: This will be adjourned till the 20th of January at two o'clock.)

MR. BEST: Your Honor, the purpose of this hearing today — it's a continuation of a hearing we had on Friday, and the Feople have one more witness to produce per Defendant's motion, and that is Officer Graver, and at this time I will call him to the stand.

# JOE GRAYER,

sworn on behalf of the People, was examined and testified upon his oath as follows:

## DIRECT EXAMINATION

### BY MR. BEST:

- Q For the record, sir, will you state your name, please.
- 20 A Joe Grayer.
- 21 Q How are you employed, sir?
  - A Detroit Police Department.
- $\parallel$  Q How were you employed in July of 1975?
  - A With the Detroit Police Department.
- $\parallel \Omega = 0$  Did you have a partner at that time?

A Yes, I did.

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- Q And what was your partner s name?
- A Officer Lorraine Williams,
  - On July 31st, 1976, do you remember if you were on duty?
- A Yes, I do.
- Q And at approximately -- were you on duty?
- A Yes, I was.

to this area.

- And at approximately one-fifty in the morning on that date did anything unusual occur?
- A I recall at around that approximate time I responded to a radio run on Chelsea, approximately the 10000 block of Chelsea, to investigate a problem over there. And while investigating this incident there was a citizen patrol unit in the area. I recall hearing a dispatch from that citizen patrol unit that there was a police officer shot in the vicinity of Harper and Barrett in the vicinity of the Great Scott Super Market. So I immediately informed my partner to
- **Q When you** got to that area what did you observe?
- A I observed a group of people standing around directly across the street from the Great Scott Super Market.

  I was the driver. I then pulled across the street. I

- observed a white male laying on the ground. 1  $^{ackslash}$  Was the white male shot at that time? 2 3 Α He was bleeding from the head. Did it appear to be a gunshot wound? 4 5 Yes, it did. 6  $\mathbb{C}$ Did you witness the shooting? 7 No, I didn't. Did you see any of the assailants or assailant at 8 () 9 the scene? 10 No, I dian t. Did you arrest any of the assailants at the scene? 11 12 No. I didn't. Did you hear any gunshot? 13 (i) 14 No, I didn't. Did you see the flash of a gunshot? 15 No, I didn't. 16 Α Did you see the victim fall to the ground? 17 18 No. I didn't. At the time that you arrived on the scene did you take 19 any witness statements from any of the people who 20 21 were standing there?
- 22 A No, I didn't.

- 23 © Do you have any idea of approximately how many people were there?
  - A There was approximately ten to fifteen people.

- Q And you didn't interview any of them?
- A No, I didn't.

- Once you got on the scene what action did you take toward the man lying on the ground?
- A I was driving the emergency wagon at that time. I was driving what we call the wagon. I stopped the vehicle, opened up the rear door, he was placed in the vehicle by some of the other officers that was standing around. I think conveyed him to I believe it was St. Johns Hospital.
- Q You helped put him on a stretcher?
- A No, I didn't help put him on anything. I just opened the door to the wagon and there was other people helping with everything and they put him in the car and I drove the vehicle to the hospital.
- G Did you know that he was a police officer at the time?
- At the time I did, yes.
  - Q Did he say anything to you?
- A No, he didn't.

MR. BEST: I have no further questions at this time, your Honor.

#### CROSS EXAMINATION

#### BY MR. EVELYN:

O Officer Grayer, you were Officer Williams' partner on this particular occasion, July of '76?

- 1 A Yes.
  2 Q And did you review anything
- 2 Q And did you review anything before you testified today
  3 to refresh your recollection concerning those events?
- 4 A I reviewed my statement, yes.
- 5 Q You read your statement?
- 6 A Yes.

- ∥ Q Did you review anything else?

  - A Somewhere around that figure. There were about ten to fifteen people, I guess; I'm not sure how many people there was.

- $\mathbb{R}^{N_{\mathrm{c}}}$  Were there other police officers present when you Q 1 \_ arrived? 2 As I approached the scene there was I believe two 3 other units that approached the scene at approximately 4 the same time I did. 5 Did you ever exit your vehicle? 0 6 Yes. 7 Α When you exited the vehicle did you go to the location  $\mathbb{Q}$ 8 where the injured person was? 9 I walked over to him -- he was lying on the ground. 10 I walked over and looked at him. 11 Let me direct your attention to something else, if 12 0 I may. You testified that the man was put on a 13 stretcher and put into the wagon; is that correct? 14 Yes. 15 Were you in the vehicle when that occurred? Were you 16 inside the wagon or outside the wagon when that 17 occurred? 18 I don't recall exactly where I was. I recall seeing --19 at there were a lot of people around and everyone was 20 trying to help. I don't recall if I was outside the 21 wagon or if I was in the wagon; I don't recall. 22
  - Q You testified that other people were trying to help;

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- A There was a lot of people around there doing a lot of different things. I don't recall exactly what any person was doing.
- Q With respect to this location by the way, were you ever able to get a description of any suspects.

- 10 | A No, I didn't.

- Q Did you indicate on direct you didn't arrest anybody?
- 12 A No. I didn't.
  - Q Did you convey any witnesses down to the police station for interviewing?
  - A I don't recall conveying anyone other than myself and my partner.
  - O Do you recall learning let me ask you this: You indicated that you knew, or believe at least as you were going to the location, that the person who had been injured or shot was a police officer; that was your testimony, is that correct?
    - When I heard the message over the radio I believed that there was a police officer shot, and when I got there I observed a man laying on the ground. I didn't know for sure that he was a police officer

- I don't remember their names now.
- Would it refresh your recollection if I were to tell 22 you the name of Van Fledering? 23
- I remember that name, yes. 24

And would he have been the man who told you that the

- injured person was a police officer?
- I don't think that he was the one. There was another officer there; he was the shorter of the two.
- Now, concerning this Officer Van Fledering, do you **(2)** recall whether he assisted the police officers who responded in giving aid to this injured man?
- Like I say, I don't recall in particular what any Α individuals did. I don't recall what any person did in particular. There were a lot of people there, there was a lot of screaming and yelling and people running around doing different things. I wasn't able to tell what any particular person was doing.

I don't know, I don't recail. Just whatever it is you do recall. Okay, let me ask  $\Omega$ you this: Can you remember how long you were at this

- location from the time you first arrived?
- From the time that I first arrived until I got to Athe hospital?
- Right -- well, until you departed.

- A I don't recall there being any directly what I would say fisticuffs or a fight like that. I recall my partner was seated on the passenger's side o the vehicle, she picked up the radio to call dispatch to relay the information I had given her, and Officer Van Fledering, he came to the passenger's side of the vehicle where my partner was seated, he pulled her out of the car.
